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

CHAIRMAN'S MESSAGE

Established in June 2008, The Centre for Liveable Cities (CLC) is now 10 years old. The Centre has positioned itself as a practitioner-oriented knowledge centre that works closely with government agencies, academic institutions and the industry to record, create and share knowledge to help make cities more liveable, sustainable and resilient in our rapid-changing world. It focuses on research and documentation of Singapore's urban development, liveability in cities and related issues of governance. CLC was also tasked with conducting training for local and international city leaders, and to promote Singapore as one of the thought leaders through the organisation of the biennial World Cities Summit (WCS).

Besides sharing knowledge, the Centre has over the years intensified the effort to exchange urban planning knowledge with other cities. The Centre has established a wide network of over 400 cities, international organisations, research institutions and industry partners, which includes the Urban Land Institute (ULI), Seoul Institute (SI), National Development and Reform Commission (NDRC), Development Research Centre of the State Council of China (DRC) and 100 Resilient Cities (100RC), among others. The Centre also provides advisory services to cities such as Amaravati, Colombo, Jakarta and Yangon.

Among the activities during the year, a major highlight was the successful completion of the **6th World Cities Summit (WCS)**, together with the WCS Mayors Forum, the WCS Young Leaders Symposium and the presentation of the Lee Kuan Yew World City Prize 2018 to Seoul. Held in Singapore from 8–12 July 2018, the Summit was attended by more than 1,800 high-level delegates, including 133 mayors and city leaders from 128 cities. Taking into account the Singapore International Water Week and the CleanEnviro Summit Singapore, the three events collectively

attracted a record 24,000 participants. What was most heartening to the Centre was that a large proportion of the participants had been coming to these events over the years. They were discussing urban issues more as friends among themselves and therefore could go into greater depth in the debate to generate more useful conclusions.

Another highlight was our involvement in the **ASEAN Smart Cities Network (ASCN)**. CLC and our Ministry of Foreign Affairs organised the ASEAN Smart Cities Governance Workshop for 26 pilot cities to develop Smart City Action Plans; and prepare the ASEAN Smart Cities Framework, the ASCN's foundational document. The Centre played a key role in matchmaking 33 MOUs and LOIs inked between the 26 cities and 108 solution partners.

Among the many publications by CLC, 'Singapore and India: Partnering for Liveable and Sustainable Cities' warrants a special mention. It attempts to document a programme organised by CLC and India's Town and Country Planning Organisation, with highlights of 11 Indian cities. The publication was presented by Singapore's Prime Minister Lee Hsien Loong to India's Prime Minister Narendra Modi in June, during his official visit to Singapore.

As CLC embarks on its second decade, we remain committed to advance our mission through deeper research, greater engagement with our partners, and to increase outreach of our capability development programmes and advisory work to meet evolving needs. We thank our Advisory Board members, stakeholders, fellows, experts, partners and staff for their contributions, to help us distil, create and share knowledge to make Singapore and other cities become more liveable and sustainable.

EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR'S MESSAGE

The Centre celebrated its 10th anniversary in 2018. With a mission to distil, create and share knowledge on liveable and sustainable cities, the Centre has established itself as a reputable knowledge centre on integrated urban planning and governance over the course of its first decade.

CLC's core product is the **Urban Systems Studies (USS)**, a practitioner-centric series of case studies that documented Singapore's urban governance, planning and development processes and achievements. Over a decade of rigorous research process and over 520 interviews with urban pioneers and domain experts, CLC completed 24 USSes that delve deep into various aspects of Singapore's development. These USSes are used by schools, research institutes and universities as useful case studies and teaching materials.

The **Singapore Liveability Framewor**k guides all of CLC's knowledge works, including the curation of all **Capability Development** programmes. This ensures participants are exposed to the deep knowledge of Singapore's urban development journey and allows fruitful discussion on future urban challenges. A total of 2,064 local and 2,269 international participants have been trained through various capability development programmes.

The year in review, from April 2018 to March 2019, was an exciting and productive one for the Centre for Liveable Cities (CLC).

Guided by the Singapore Liveability Framework, experts and visiting fellows, our applied research projects completed in 2018 focused on ways to create a better work-live-play-learn environment in Singapore's one-north innovation district and to make mature estates like Tampines more liveable, sustainable and people-friendly. CLC collaborated with Seoul Institute to explore the ageing landscape in Seoul and Singapore and the ongoing efforts to create age-friendly cities. CLC also partnered

100 Resilient Cities to examine how Singapore can overcome key challenges, especially new and complex ones such as climate change and demographic shifts to create 'A Resilient Singapore' – the title of our joint publication. Research that raised cross-cutting issues and innovative urban solutions were also published as insights pieces that are disseminated to key policymakes, including Ministers, Permanent Secretaries and CEOs of government agencies.

The Centre continues to provide various knowledge platforms like the World Cities Summit (WCS), CLC lecture series and Urban Solutions – CLC's flagship magazine, for urban practitioners and thought leaders to exchange knowledge. Throughout the year, 11 lectures were organised and each was attended by over 200 participants.

Our capability development efforts for 2018 includes the Leaders in Urban Governance Programme (LUGP) and Executive Development and Growth Exchange (EDGE) training programmes for Singapore officials; and international programmes like the Singapore – UN-Habitat International the Leaders in Urban Governance Programme (SG – UN-Habitat iLUGP) and Temasek Foundation International Leaders in Urban Governance Programme (TFILUGP) trained 137 city leaders from 51 cities.


These and other achievements during 2018-19 are highlighted in this report, "Celebrating Sustainable and Resilient Cities".

All in all, CLC has built up strengths as a knowledge repository of Singapore's urban development experiences and a knowledge centre for urban thought leadership training. CLC will continue to strengthen as a leading knowledge centre on urban governance and systems and continue to expand its network of cities, international organisations, research institutions and industry partners. This will propel the global mindshare of Singapore's leading position in liveability and sustainability.





ASEAN Smart Cities Network (ASCN)

The Association of Southeast Asian Nations (ASEAN) is undergoing rapid urbanisation. This leads to increased challenges of congestion, strained infrastructure, pollution, climate change, lack of affordable housing and socio-economic equity. At the same time, cities are looking to harness digital technologies and "smart" solutions to become more efficient, sustainable and liveable.

Under Singapore's recent Chairmanship of the ASEAN, Member States recognised the benefits to harness digital technologies and "smart" solutions to make cities more efficient, sustainable and liveable. This led to the establishment of the ASEAN Smart Cities Network (ASCN) in April 2018. The ASCN's goal is to improve the lives of people using technology as an enabler. Initially focusing on a pioneering batch of 26 cities, the ASCN aims to provide a platform where regional development strategies can be translated and coordinated at the central level and implemented at the city level. ASCN introduced the role of Chief Smart City Officer, who oversees the city's drive towards smart and sustainable urbanisation. The ASCN will:

- Promote cooperation on smart city development among ASEAN cities;
- Develop commercially viable projects together with private-sector solution providers;
- Facilitate collaboration with ASEAN's external partners through funding and other avenues of support.

ASEAN Smart Cities Framework


CLC and MFA played a key role in preparing the ASEAN Smart Cities Framework, a foundational document that serves as a non-binding guide for the region. Following several rounds of discussions among member cities and national representatives during the ASEAN Smart Cities Governance Workshop, the Framework was endorsed by the ASCN at the Inaugural ASCN Meeting and formally adopted by regional leaders at the 33rd ASEAN Summit in November 2018. It encapsulates the region's collective voices and shared vision of sustainable urbanisation and sets out ASEAN's definition of a smart city.

ASEAN Smart Cities Governance Workshop

Organised by CLC and MFA from 22–25 May 2018, the ASEAN Smart Cities Governance Workshop was the first milestone in the ASCN's journey. Attended by 70 officials from ASEAN countries and member cities, the Workshop forged meaningful relationships that will undergird this network. The cities worked with expert consultants to develop their Smart City Action Plans (SCAPs), discussed the draft ASEAN Smart Cities Framework and networked with prospective partners from the public and private sectors to explore potential collaborations on commercially viable projects.

The ASCN cities further developed their SCAPs and priority projects, which were unveiled at the Inaugural ASCN Meeting held on 8 July 2018, during the World Cities Summit.

World Cities Summit 2018

The 6th edition of the World Cities Summit (WCS) held in Singapore from 8 to 12 July 2018 drew more than 1,800 delegates, including 133 mayors and 43 high-level ministers.

Key highlights included the 9th WCS Mayors Forum, the 5th WCS Young Leaders Symposium and the presentation of the Lee Kuan Yew World City Prize 2018 to Seoul, recognising their initiatives to address rapid urbanisation by harnessing smart technologies and citizen inputs.

The Summit's overall theme—Liveable & Sustainable Cities: Embracing the Future through Innovation and Collaboration—underscored the need for adaptation to changes and active community participation in the face of disruptive technologies and global challenges, such as climate change and ageing populations. Four main themes—Governance, Planning, Resilience and Innovation—framed the sharing of common problems, best practices and policy options. Cities were urged to take the next step up to address current major urban issues by partnering with public and private sector agencies in more integrated ways.

The WCS provided cities the **opportunities to learn** from each other on how to address shared challenges. Global financial centres can demonstrate innovative ways to tap capital markets to fund urban development projects.




Disruptive technologies were in the spotlight, highlighting the transformative changes they can bring to almost all aspects of society, including new modes of business, communication and transport. Delegates also discussed on how to address industry churn and job losses by re-skilling workers for new roles arising from technological change. Leaders were also urged to remain mindful of people left behind by the tides of change and ensure inclusivity.

Delegates called for **greater people participation** to involve an increasingly active and vocal citizenry in the co-creation of urban solutions to improve liveability and sustainability. While the WCS has emphasised the importance of making cities more 'people-centric', this year's Summit took it further with calls to add a fourth 'P' (People) to the established concept of Public-Private Partnerships.

Social resilience and environmental sustainability were recognised as important aspects of liveability that will increasingly influence the health and physical wellbeing of urban dwellers and require fresh and innovative approaches. These includes promoting sports to improve the health of an ageing population, using GPS-enabled snow excavators to rescue the elderly and providing free reading glasses

for all seniors.





Reimagining one-north

one-north is home to Singapore's knowledgeintensive and innovation-based industries. It hosts clusters of world-class research facilities and business park space to support the growth of biomedical sciences, information and communication technology, media, physical sciences and engineering.

CLC conducted a joint research with JTC in a three-part study of the district. It built upon our 'Reimagining' series of forward-looking research projects, deploying a methodology that requires a comprehensive and critical review of the district from multiple viewpoints.

The first part comprised primary research focused on the social, real estate and urban design analysis of the district. It drew on collaborative discussions and workshops with key agencies, stakeholder interviews, analysis of relevant data sets from government agencies, expert-led workshops and user surveys to analyse the strengths and weaknesses of one-north, resulting in four key recommendations for its ongoing development.

The second part took the mobility and connectivity aspects of the initial primary research deeper through collaboration with the Master of Landscape Architecture programme offered by the National University of Singapore (NUS) School of Design and Environment's Department of Architecture. This took the form of an intense design studio that delivered a rigorous and comprehensive set of ideas targeted at transforming one-north into a walkable and cyclable district, using both quantitative and qualitative analysis.

The final part of this study built upon the strategies of the first two parts, with CLC partnering NUS Lee Kuan Yew School of Public Policy to develop a set of critical questions on one-north's progress, especially on whether it has lived up to the expectations of its stakeholders. A set of policy recommendations was proposed, stemming from earlier research findings.

A Resilient Singapore

(collaboration with 100 Resilient Cities)

"A Resilient Singapore" is jointly published by CLC and 100 Resilient Cities (100RC). "A Resilient Singapore" captures Singapore's transformation from urban squalor of the 1960s to one of the world's most liveable cities and maps out how it can tackle two new key challenges of climate change and shifting demographics.

While integrated long-term planning and sound urban governance have enabled Singapore to adapt and thrive despite stresses and shocks, the new and complex challenges require non-conventional solutions that recognise how people and communities are at the heart of resilience.

Climate change and shifting demographics have significant impacts across different sectors. Some issues such as flash floods are already apparent. As a small, low-lying island, Singapore faces an existential threat from rising sea levels. Increasing average daily temperatures can cause the proliferation of diseases such as Dengue and Zika. Climate change also leads to crop failures in countries from which Singapore


imports its food. An increase in rainfall intensity could overwhelm even an expanded drainage system and cause flash floods. Hence, water security and flood prevention plans must be able to cope with impacts of changing weather patterns.

Demographic changes arising from an ageing population and calibrated immigration will test Singapore's social resilience and require continued work in building communities and trust in a multicultural, multiracial and multi-religious city-state.


Rules-based approaches that have helped Singapore succeed thus far may not necessarily be suitable for tackling the two key challenges. "A Resilient Singapore" calls for a more values-based approach to the city-state's challenges and opportunities. This requires the community to be better educated and engaged on the key risks and challenges, and for the government to continue reaching out and co-create solutions with various stakeholders.



Age-Friendly Cities

Seoul and Singapore are experiencing a demographic shift as their populations age. Over the years, both cities have formulated plans, programmes and policies to support their seniors to live healthily, actively and purposefully as they navigate their daily lives within high-density urban environments. Both Seoul and Singapore share common aspirations to continue building age-friendly cities that support and empower their seniors.

"Age-Friendly Cities: Lessons from Seoul and Singapore" is the third joint research publication between the Centre for Liveable Cities and the Seoul Institute. This publication explores the current and future ageing landscape in Seoul and Singapore and their ongoing efforts to address these issues. Case studies are examined under the themes of ageing-in-place and active ageing to distil common lessons on how cities can be more inclusive for seniors.

Reimagining one-north: The Way Forward

one-north was conceived as a cluster of world-class research facilities and business park spaces to support the growth of biomedical sciences, infocomm technology, media, physical sciences and engineering in Singapore to create a knowledge-based economy. While the district has attracted a good mix of enterprises in the envisioned sectors, there are several aspects of development that could be better optimised, especially in relation to create a work-live-playlearn environment and a vibrant urban innovation hub. This report analyses the strengths and weaknesses of one-north and makes recommendations for its further development.



Tampines Liveability Blueprint 2018 Addendum

This report is an addendum to the Tampines Liveability Blueprint produced in 2015. It complements the original blueprint with methodologies and solutions that were conceptualised and experimented during the 2017 Local Planning Pilot, which focused on applying concepts from the Liveability Blueprint to ongoing projects by the Town Council and other agencies. Highlights of 2018 VF Programme



Dr Wang Lin

Dr Wang traced the historical evolution of conservation policies in Shanghai and explained the principles and approaches guiding the efforts occurring at different scales—from individual buildings to streets, allowing the city to examine an entire district. She highlighted examples that might be useful to Singapore, and exchanged ideas with local planners on current policies for conservation districts, which includes greenery, gentrification and height restrictions.

Prof West shared knowledge on complexity science and his research on a scientific framework governing the growth and development of cities. His visit helped prepare for the second Urban Complexity Studio, held from 20–24 August at the Santa Fe Institute to explore concepts and techniques from complexity science to understand and address Singapore's urban issues. Highlights of 2018 Workshops



2nd Urban Complexity Studio at Santa Fe Institute

The 2nd Urban Complexity Studio was held from 20–24 August 2018 at the Santa Fe Institute. It facilitated a two-way exchange between scientists, led by Prof Geoffrey West, and 18 Singapore government representatives. The inter-agency team synthesised the learning outcomes into three complexity lenses of inquiry to organise the research. The workshop also served as a platform to engage and cultivate a pool of global experts attuned to Singapore's urban context.



UrbanPlan Workshops

CLC collaborated with the Urban Land Institute (ULI), the Institute of Real Estate and Urban Studies (IREUS) and National University of Singapore (NUS) to tailored Singapore's inaugural UrbanPlan for Public Officials to suit Singapore's development and land-bidding system. The Lego-based development scenario workshop was designed around a two-envelope system to provide insights into private developers' point of view and enables recognition of trade-offs between social objectives and financial goals in public-private-partnerships.







Planning for Ageing @ Ang Mo Kio Town – TOUCH Town Audit Trail

TOUCH Community Services piloted the Community
Enablement Project (CEP), which aims to enable frail
elderly to age in their home and community. CLC
worked with TOUCH Community Services and Ang Mo
Kio Family Service Centre to curate a simulated town
audit to understand the CEP and assess whether the
infrastructures of the neighbourhood makes for a
more comfortable home for the ageing residents.
Participants are led through a route around the
neighbourhood, stepping into the shoes of a physically
challenged or visually impaired person, through roleplaying and using props such as wheelchairs, walking
sticks and glasses to simulate low visibility.

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

5th Senior Chinese Officials Study Visit
